South Carolina's Juvenile Justice Program is a federally funded initiative supported by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP). Appropriations occur under the JJDP Act of 1974, as amended. The Juvenile Justice Program is administered by the S.C. Department of Public Safety, Office of Justice Programs.

Title II, Part B Formula Grant Program

The Title II, Part B Formula Grant Program provides seed money for innovative delinquency programs statewide. It is federally funded through the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP). Recipients can include private not-for-profit agencies, units of local government and state agencies. The Formula program supports programs involved with alternatives to secure confinement, the deinstitutionalization of status offenders, and the reduction of the overrepresentation of minorities in the state's juvenile justice system. Funds from the Formula grant program also support the administration of all the funding streams, provide resources to the Governor's Juvenile Justice Advisory Council (GJJAC), and support monitoring of compliance with the core requirements dealing with jail removal and separation of children from adults in the system. Title V, Community-Based Delinquency Prevention Program

The Title V, Community-Based Delinquency Prevention Program is a federal initiative out of OJJDP to provide seed money for community-based comprehensive delinquency prevention strategies based on local prevention needs assessments. Recipients of these funds will be units of local government, working in partnership with local juvenile service agencies. Successful applicants must provide a match of 50% of the federal award (e.g., a total \$60,000 project with \$40,000 federal funds would require \$20,000 local match).
